Mary Lee and Jack Aylesbury are the athletes, and succeeded in giving IAC a place in the School Sports.

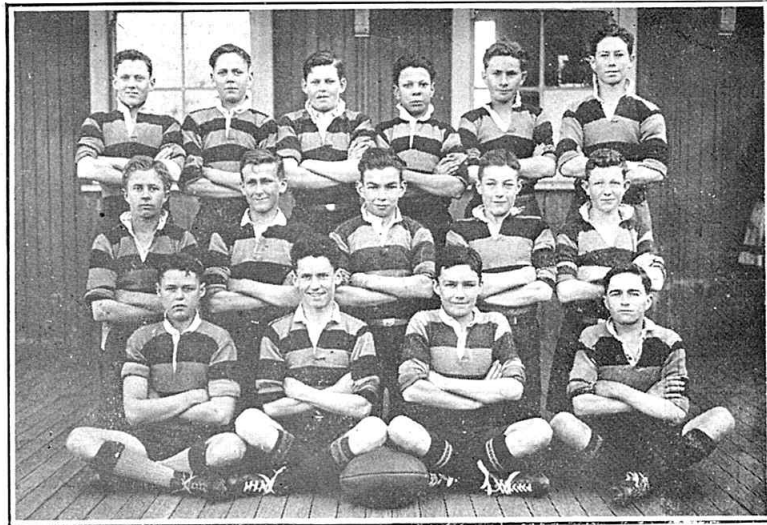

## LOCAL HISTORY

A large and flourishing new industry has lately been established at Port Stephens—that of hunting sharks for their leather and oil. The sharks are caught in huge set nets called "gills." These nets are about 600 feet long, 30 feet deep and with a mesh about 8 to 12 inches.

The hunting is carried out in boats only 30 feet in length, and there is often some excitement. The boats are driven by Diesel engines, and are equipped with a small hoisting crane to lift the sharks on deck. Each vessel can work several nets simultaneously.

The nets are set overnight and are taken up in the morning. The sharks caught are mostly dead, but if some are alive they are clubbed to death or are shot with a specially provided pistol.

The monsters are taken ashore and treated. On the decks they are skinned and cut into fillets, pickled in brine, and placed in a dehydrator. The fins are exported to China, and the East; being rich in gelatine, they bring a high price. Cod liver oil is removed from the large lobed liver.

However, the most important product is the leather, which, by a modern process, may be obtained from the hide. This leather is of a very high quality and gets a high price at the markets.

The shark hunting industry is not a new one, for it has been carried out in various parts of Australia, but the leather was imperfect because of the scales, until the introduction of the new method to remove the "shagreen."

## THE INAUGURATION OF THE GREAT NORTHERN RAILWAY.

In the fifties of last century, the Hunter River Valley was considered the most productive and important district in the Colony, whether regarded from an agricultural, pastoral or mineral point of view. A large population had settled in the locality, and the opening out of the extensive coalfields led to the establishment of manufacturing industries. But the great drawback to the progress of the district was the want of a cheap and reliable means of communication; the average

cost of the cartage at that period being two shillings per ton per mile, while the time of delivery was very uncertain indeed. Under these conditions, it was held by many people that the railway between Newcastle and Maitland would soon command the greater portion of the northern district trade, which would be carried by rail to Newcastle and then taken by large ships to Sydney, instead of being collected by small craft on the Lower Hunter and rivers in confluence with it, and then conveyed to Sydney.

On the twentieth of April, 1853, a largely attended meeting was held at the Royal Hotel, Newcastle with the aim of building of a railway between the two towns.

It was resolved at the meeting that an incorporated company of £100,000 be formed, to be styled "The Hunter River Railway Company" and that for this purpose a subscription to that amount in shares of £5 each be opened at once, a deposit of 2/6 per share to be paid on each share on allotment. A subscription list was opened and no less than 53,400 shares were applied for on the spot.

A temporary committee was appointed and resolutions relating to financial questions were carried. It was further resolved that in the event of the capital proving insufficient, additional shares were to be created; but that unless encouragement similar to that granted to the "Sydney Railway Company" which had built the Parramatta line, were conceded by the Government, the undertaking would not be proceeded with.

These resolutions were communicated to the Government and favourably received. A bill for the incorporation of the "Hunter River Railway Company" was passed by the Legislative Council, and the Act received Royal Consent on 10th October, 1853.

The company was formed and held a meeting to decide where the terminus would be. By a vote of members, the site was fixed at Honeysuckle. The company brought 500 labourers out from England to work on the construction. The first sod of the Great Northern Railway was turned by the Chairman of the company on 8th November, 1854.

But after an existence of a little over a year the company found itself in financial difficulties, which subsequently led to the whole of the company's work and interests being taken over by the Government. In view of the unsatisfactory position in which the company was placed a parliamentary select

committee was appointed in June, 1854, to inquire and report what measures should be adopted to improve the existing roads, and to provide for the general introduction of railways into the Colony.

The committee made a report stating that the people were unwilling to risk their money and that it was the general opinion that the Government should take over all railway construction work.

The shareholders of the Hunter River Railway Company did not get as much money out of the transaction as did other private company shareholders.

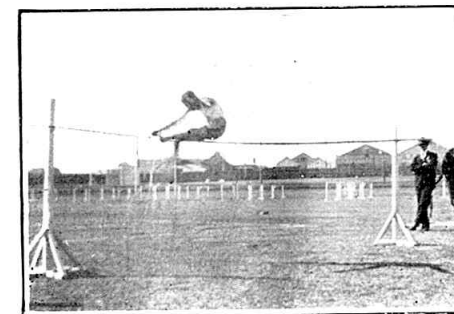
The Government then disapproved of the Honeysuckle terminus site, and the terminus was moved to its present position.

The work of extending the line from Maitland to Lochinvar was commenced in November, 1858, and the line was opened for traffic on the second of July, 1860. A contract to take the line from Lochinvar to about 31 chains this side of the Hunter at Singleton was entered into by Sir S. M. Peto, Brassey and Betts, English railway contractors.

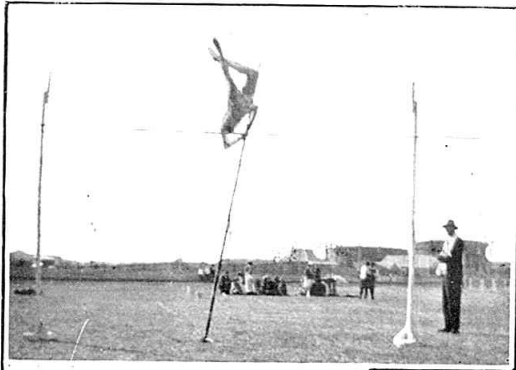
Delay was caused in the building of the Singleton bridge, and it was in May, 1865, that it was completed.

In three sections the line was carried to Murrurundi. At the present time it extends to Wallangarra, and then to Brisbane by the Queensland railway.

# SPORTS

## SUMMER SPORT.

Owing to the number of boys wishing to go swimming on Wednesday afternoons, new arrangements have had to be made this year. It was found that if all intending swimmers had been permitted to go to the baths on Wednesdays, that there would not have been sufficient teachers to look after them. Further, the congestion at the baths would have been so great, that swimming would have been a mere pretence.

In the circumstances, it was decided to debar First Year from swimming altogether, and to insist that all boys who had selected cricket as their summer sport in the first term, should continue to play that game, while boys were to be encouraged, as far as possible, to change over from swimming to cricket.

It is realised that, as a part of school training, swimming cannot be compared with a team game like cricket, and that, if school spirit and team spirit are to be properly inculcated, we must begin to do so as early as possible. Hence the desire to make cricketers above all out of our first year boys.

It is a fact, too, that little actual proficiency in swimming can be developed by attending the baths on Wednesday afternoons, as the congestion is such that boys can do no real swimming, and, where the proportion of masters to boys is one to thirty, coaching is impossible.

We have reason to hope that in another four years, we shall have every boy in the school playing some team game on Wednesday afternoon.

So far as competition swimming is concerned in which, by the way, we have been by no means successful in the past, that should not suffer, as the real swimmer has six other days in the week in which he can train, and, as already pointed out, he cannot train on Wednesday afternoon, anyhow.

The organisation was excellent and a very heavy programme was disposed of without a hitch.

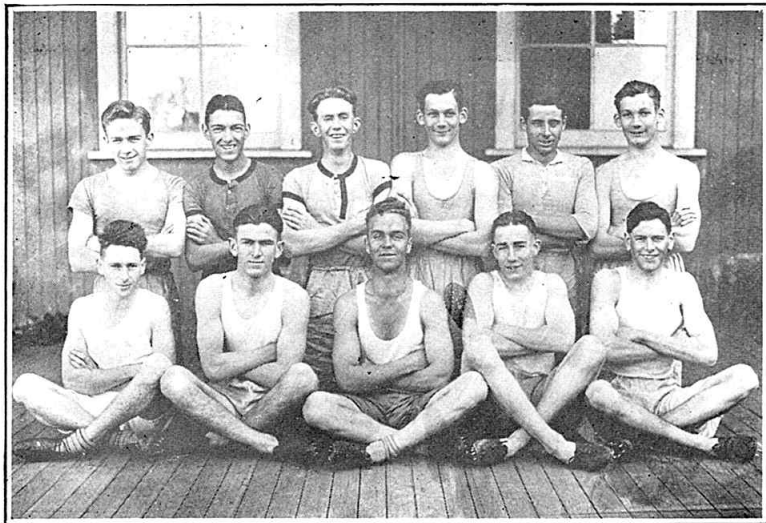
