Mr. Burrows has played a very constructive part in the criticism of some works, and, although his tastes did not extend to some of the contemporary composers, he politely and silently endured them.

A final note on the fact that more time should be devoted to contemporary English and Australian composers in the future programmes, so that younger members will not be bewildered (to say the least) by a sudden introduction to Gustav Holst and John Antill over the air or at symphony concerts. After the funeral of the club, we elder members would suggest the playing of Vaughan Williams' Sinfonia Antarctica; it will freeze the soul of anyone.

A GRADE: So far, out of three matches we have had three wins, and we are co-leaders in the competition. One match against Plattsburg

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

In late July the annual Northern versus Combined Sydney High Schools match was played at Maitland in unpleasant conditions. This school dominated the team of eight boys selected for the North. Those chosen from this school were Goffet, Curran, Matthews, Marshall, Andrews and Allen (capt.). Andrews withdrew because of important examinations. The team, though easily beaten, gave a reasonable account of itself. The lower seeded boys did particularly well. Mulligan, the No. 1 for Sydney, showed himself to be in a class above any other player in either team and had easy wins. It is at this carnival that we usually assess our chances of success at Sydney, and those who succeeded at Maitland succeeded at Sydney. With disappointment we saw our hopes in Richards dashed by Woods of Maitland High, but they were raised again in brilliance at Sydney. The competition between these two, which brought the Sydney crowds to their feet, appeared first at Maitland with the victory of Woods, although both broke records. In regard to the point score, which shows no more than the physical strength of a team, not its spirit, we gained second in the Aggregate and Senior and third in the Junior. Of the twelve new records, five were created by us.

The Combined High Schools Carnival at Sydney was, however, a different matter, in which our success equalled Maitland's because of individual effort. The general weakness of our team was shown by our few finalists in comparison to other country schools'. Because of the increased number of schools the programme was changed from heats and finals to three divisions for Sydney, one for Country, with the first three place-getters proceeding to the final—a much fairer system of elimination.

Five of our swimmers succeeded in reaching the N.S.W. Schools finals, three in more than one event. They were D. Stuart (Under 16), Michael Parke (Senior), Bill Childs (Under 13), "Ogy" Richards (Under 16), and myseli. In addition the Senior Relay team, including Jim Lees, Don Owens, Michael Parke and "Ogy", won the Country division.

The final day was outstanding for the school. Against competition from trial Olympic swimmers, "Ogy" Richards in a tense and thrilling race created a new Under 16 440-yards record, defeating his previous

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
