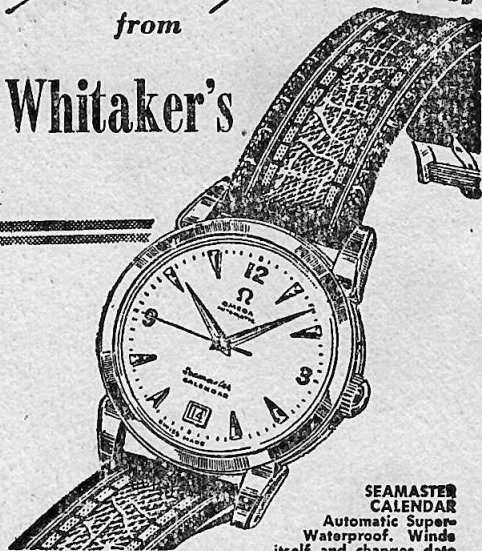

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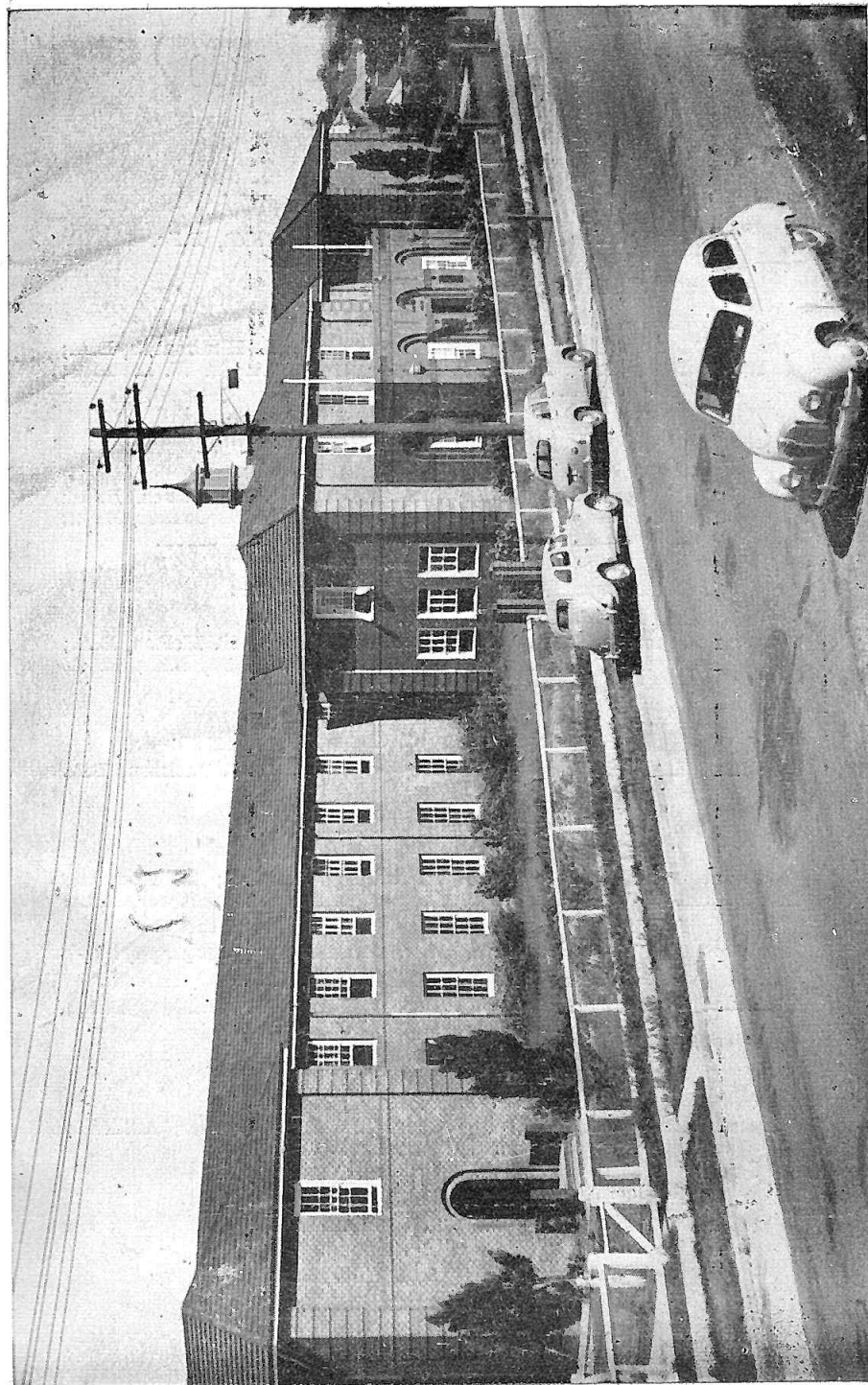

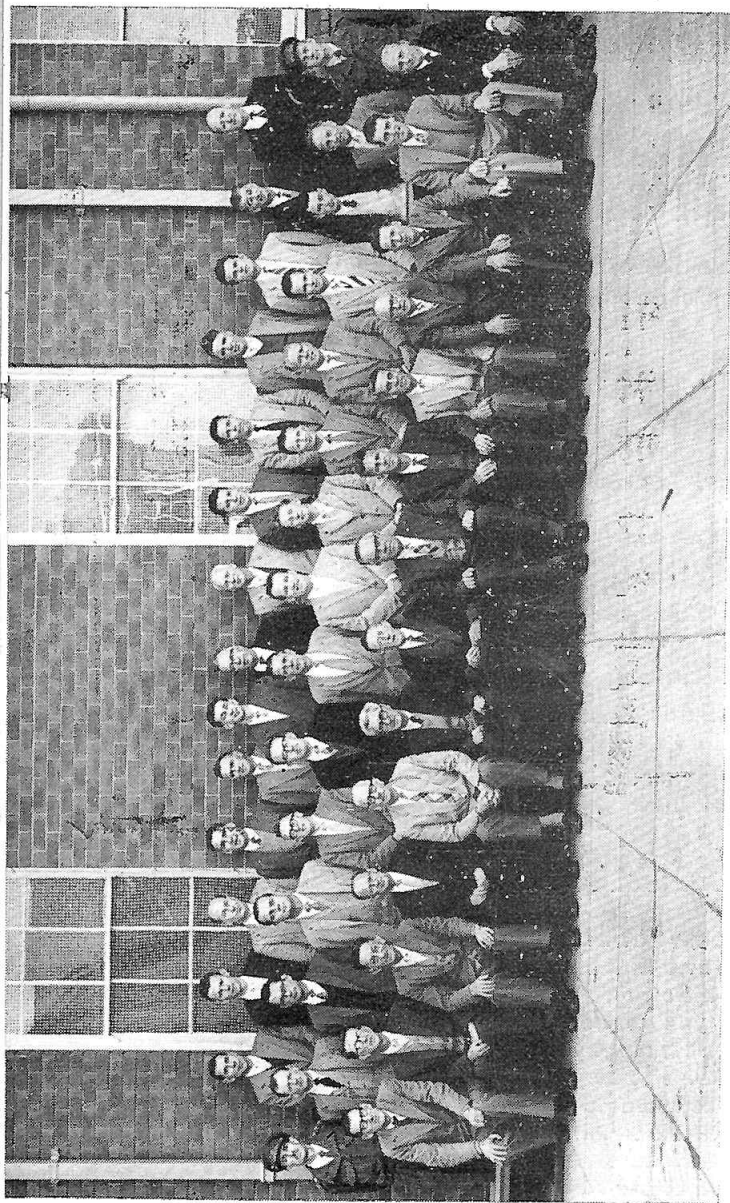

Many of you boys know all about training. Without solid training our Firsts would not have won the University Shield nor our Athletes the Lintott Cup. I wonder do you ever really think of school as a period of training for the life that lies ahead?

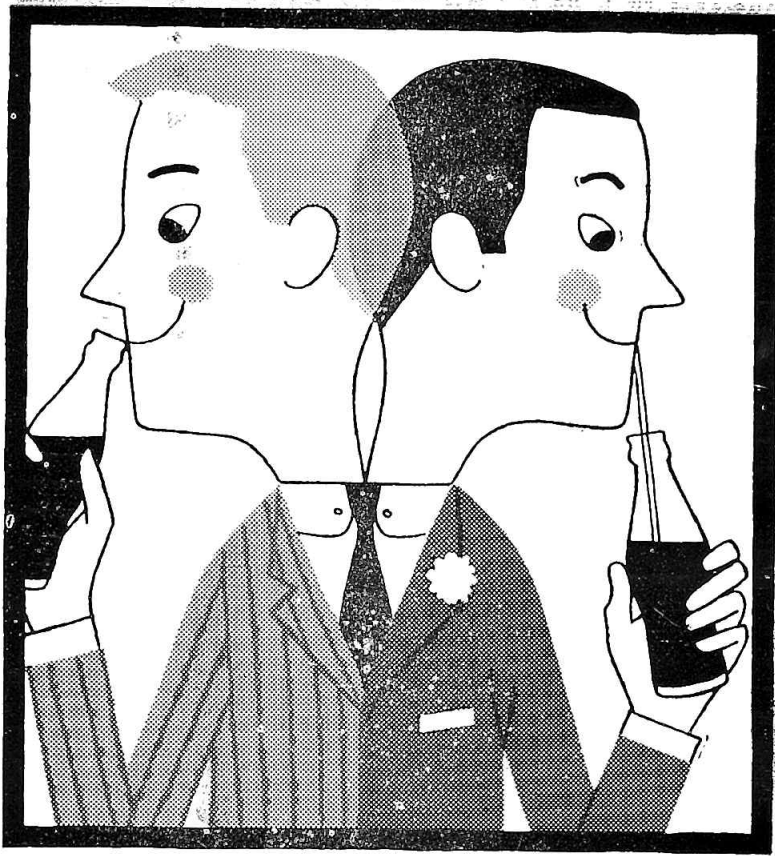
These are days when the whole world needs trained men. It is your duty to fit yourselves physically and mentally for doing a man's work and trying to solve some of the greatest problems that have ever confronted mankind. You need most of all to develop the right kind of character and attitudes so that you may have ideas which will benefit the community you enter when your school days are over. But ideas are not enough. You must be able to express them in such a way that they will influence other people. It is chiefly for this reason that we have introduced the course in Public Speaking into the school this year. So continue to do your very best in this new section of your work, realising that you are in training for worthwhile leadership later on.

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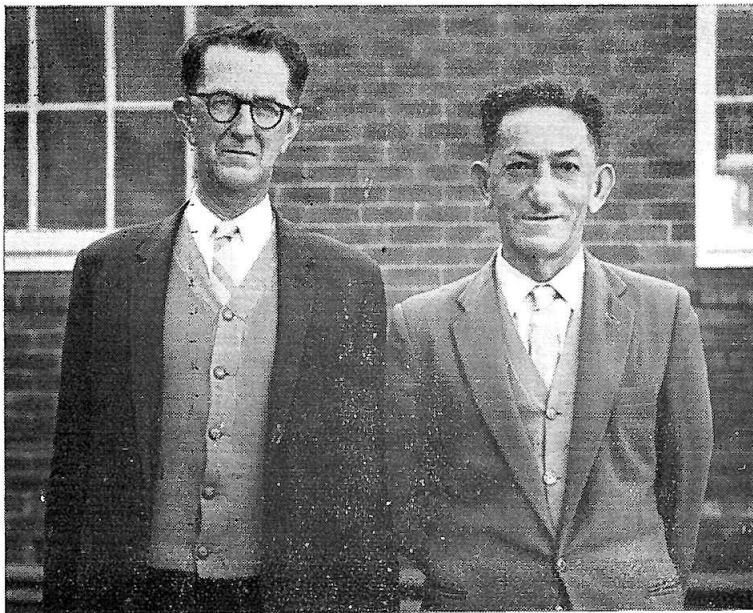

TWO VETERANS RETIRING

When former students held a re-union dinner on 14th August this year to commemorate the official opening of this building twenty-five years ago, they honoured two of our teachers who had been members of the staff for the whole period. They were Mr. A. E. Denham and Mr. D. Davies. Both are retiring at the end of this year.

Their many friends in the school now and among former students will unite in wishing these two fine teachers the greatest happiness in their retirement. They have served the school and their pupils with a great devotion and have endeared themselves to large numbers of boys who are now in many places and varied walks of life. Many were the affectionate reminiscences heard at the Jubilee Dinner of "Danny" Davies and "Albie" Denham.

Mr. Denham was educated at Parramatta High School, to which he went from a small country school. He graduated from Sydney University in 1921 and gained the Diploma of Modern Languages the same year. After terms at Adelong, Tumut and Temora, he came to Newcastle in 1934, spent one year at the old school on the Hill and then came out to Waratah. When, in 1940, the Education

Department decided to appoint Careers Advisors to High Schools, this work was entrusted to Mr. Denham, and ever since then he has rendered wonderful service to school "leavers". But not only has he advised them on their choice of career. His warm sympathy and understanding have made him a wise counsellor to those who had personal problems. Many seniors will probably remember him best for his witty speeches at Fifth Year Farewells and particularly of late years, his presentation of the Trowel to the one who made the most flowery speech on that occasion.

Mr. Davies is a graduate of Bangor University, Wales. He served in the British Army in World War I. He came to Australia in 1923 and taught for a time at Unley High School in Adelaide. He then taught in Kempsey and Taree High Schools in this State and came to the old Newcastle High School in 1933. The following year he came out to this school when it was opened.

Mr. Davies will always be remembered by his former colleagues for his friendliness, sense of humour and general good fellowship in the staff room, and by his former pupils for his passionate devotion to mathematics, his earnestness in teaching it, his exasperation with boys whose love for the subject was not as great as his, but withal his kindness and genuine goodwill towards them all.

The whole school very sincerely thanks these two teachers for their service and wishes them a long and very happy retirement.

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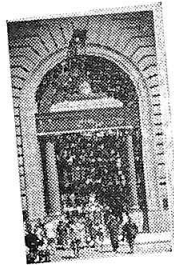

D. Gee (pianist). They played a "Trio" by San Martini, and a "Vivace" by Loeillet.



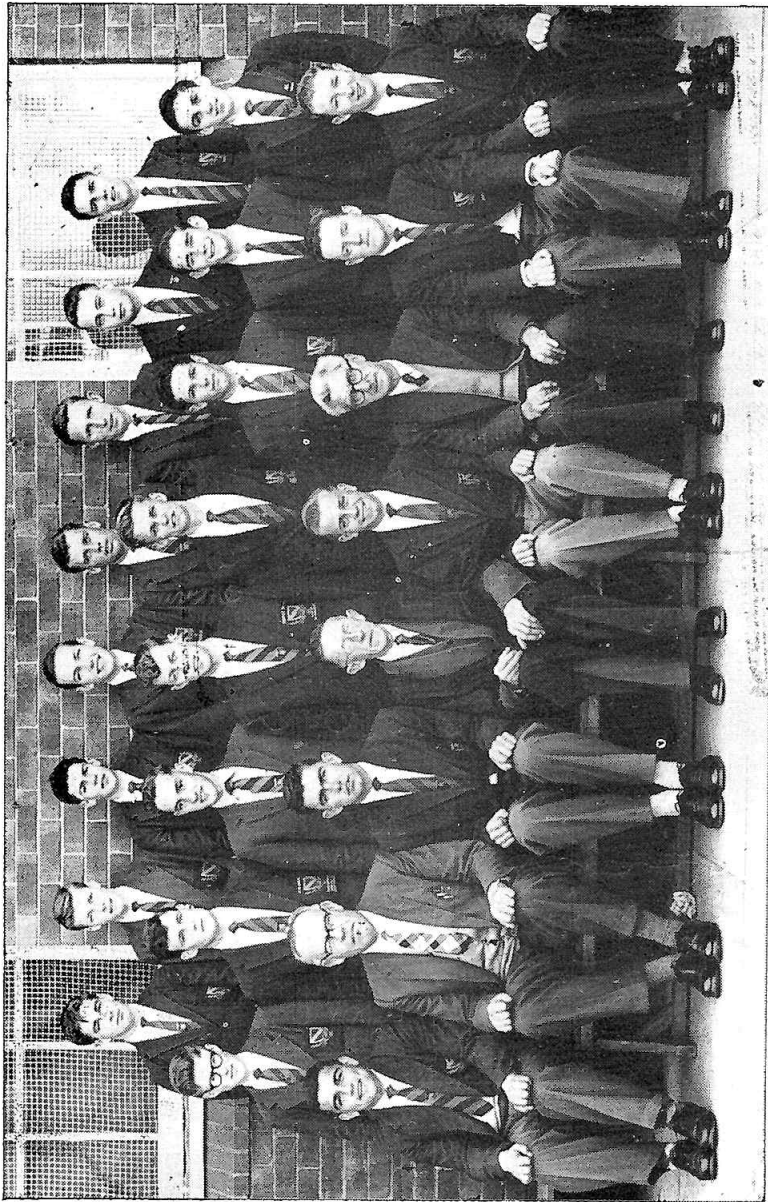

PARENTS AND CITIZENS' ASSOCIATION

With a record enrolment of over 1000 pupils the interest taken by parents in the affairs of the Association is most disappointing. It does not seem to be realised sufficiently that it is through its activities very practical and necessary assistance can be extended to all boys at the School.

In spite of the apathy of parents much has been achieved during the year under review.

Financially we have committed ourselves to an expenditure of £1244 all directed towards improving facilities at the School not provided by the Education Department. We have organised a number of activities to raise these funds. In addition we have made an appeal for direct donations to all parents and local business houses.

Greatest item of expenditure is £400 for provision of part time clerical assistance for the Headmaster. This has proved a wise move for it has enabled Mr. Beard to spend less time on administrative details and more amongst the boys.

The annual fete was seriously affected by rain and estimated income from this source was not realised.

During the year the two branches of the Ladies' Auxiliary decided to amalgamate. These ladies work very hard in the interests of the School. Their efforts are sincerely appreciated by the Association — without them we would find it difficult to function.

Strong efforts have been continued to have an adequate Assembly Hall built at the School — so far without success.

On the 18th August we had a Jubilee Dinner to celebrate the 25th Anniversary of the opening of the present School buildings. Mr. Christmas, the Headmaster at the time, was one of the guests of honour at the function. It is worth mentioning that the School was erected during the depression of the 1930's and very little has been spent on it since.

The Association has affiliated with the N.S.W. Selective High Schools Parents and Ex-Students' Association. On present indications the Education Dept., intends to abolish the present Selective status of the School and the position is being watched carefully with a view to taking any remedial action considered necessary. This matter warrants far greater interest by parents.

The Association appreciates the continued interest and support of the Headmaster and his Staff. We thank them for their efforts to teach and train our boys in the fields of education and good citizenship.

This report would not be complete without thanking our Parliamentary and Civic Representatives for their help and encouragement throughout the year.

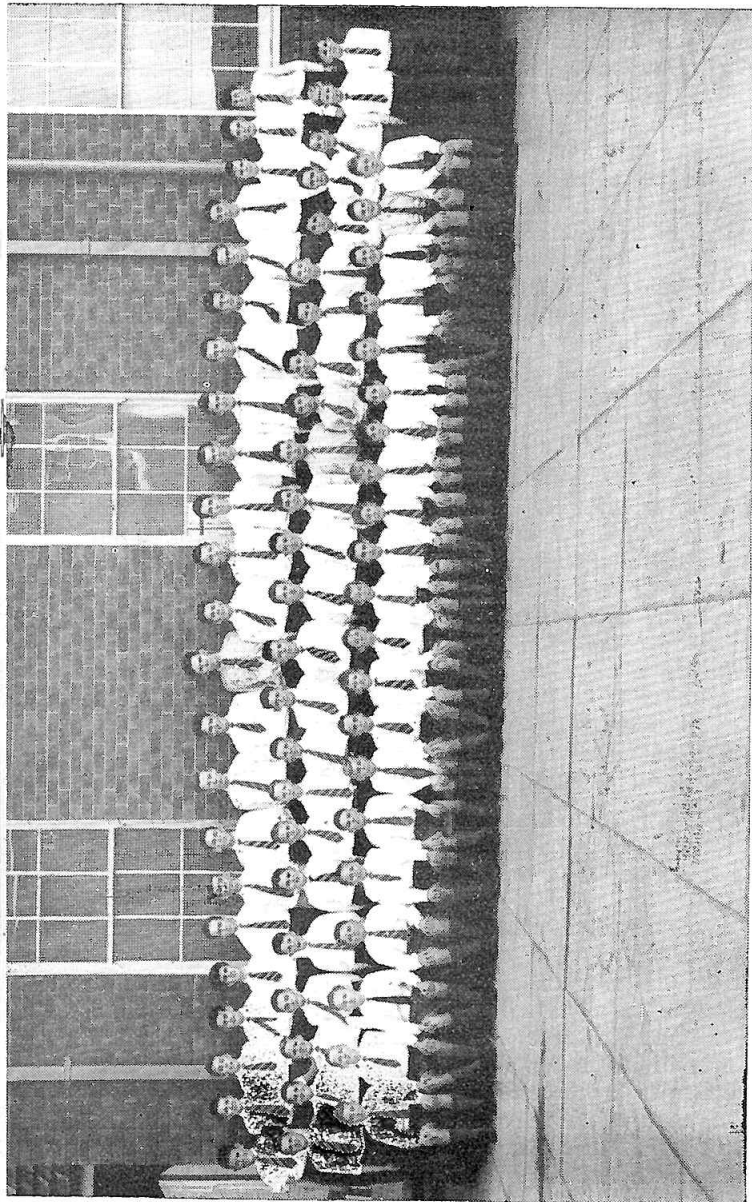
NEWCASTLE BOYS' HIGH SCHOOL CHOIR REPORT

REPORT OF SCHOOL ORCHESTRA

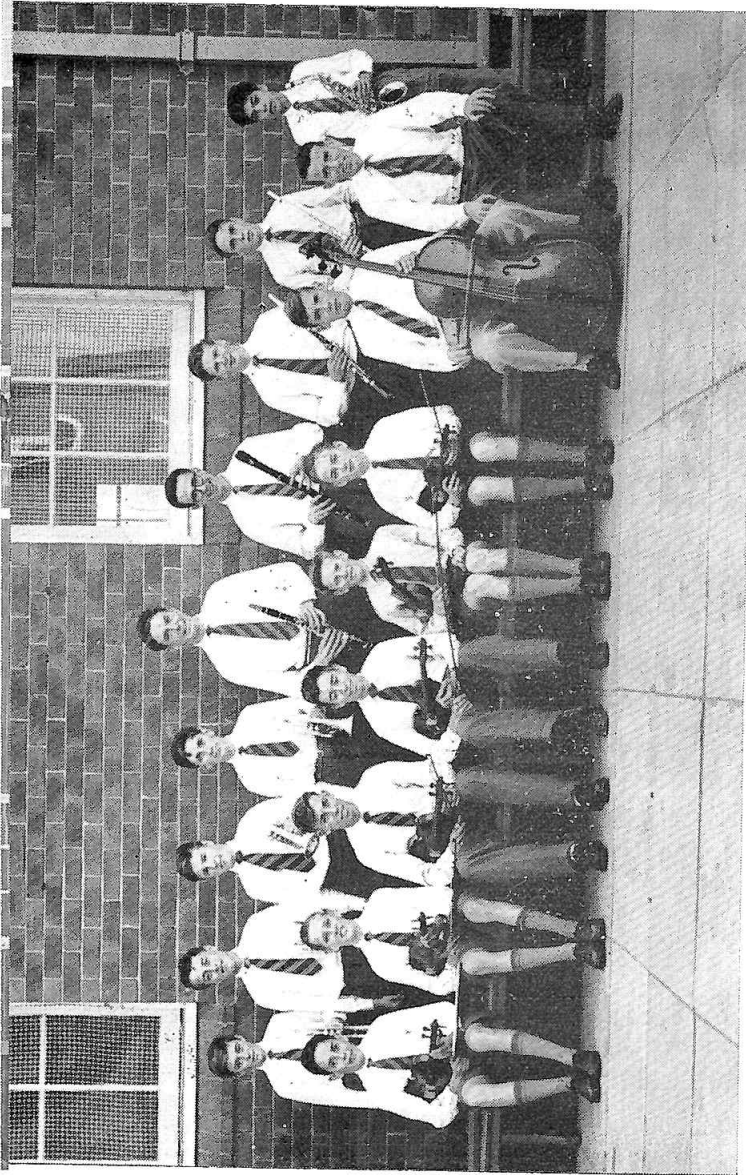

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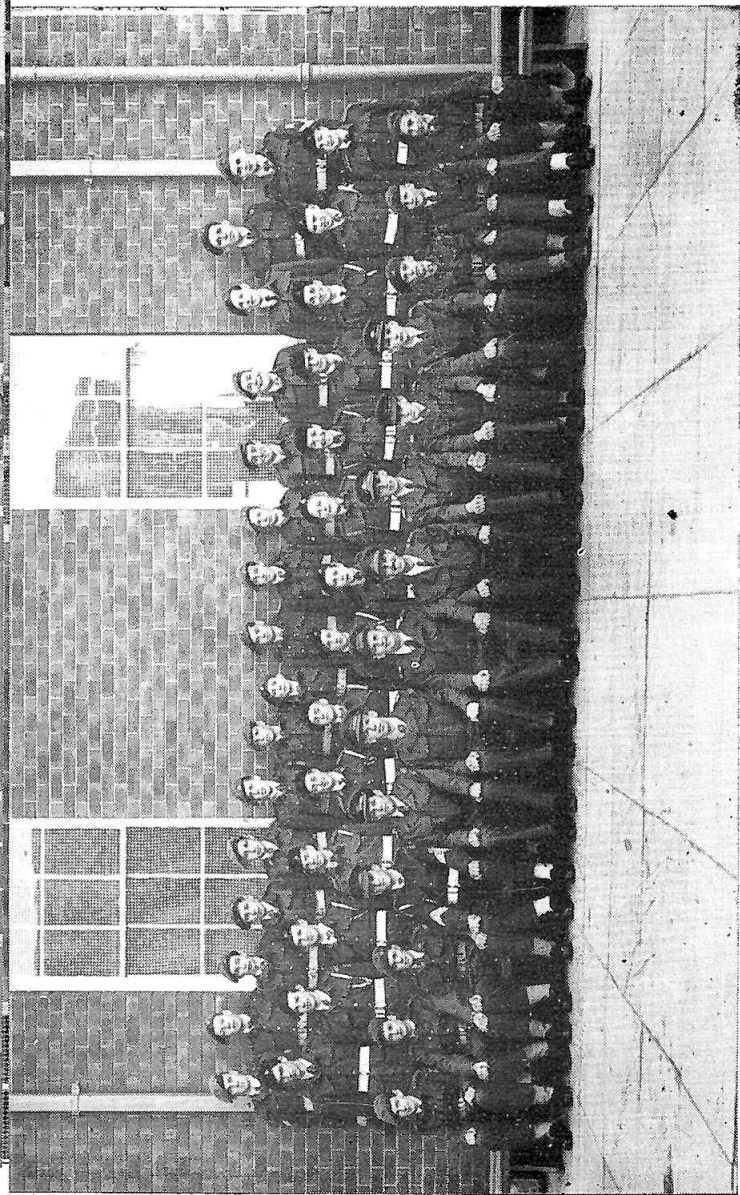

The Cadet Corps achieves many things in many different ways. The boy who joins is offered an interesting variation to his normal way of life and the cadet corps' primary aim is to bring out the qualities of citizenship, self-discipline, initiative, leadership, self-respect, and confidence that the boy possesses. It is obvious that Captain James, the O.C., has endeavoured to see that these aims are realized. It has been his policy to give the boys as much responsibility as possible; to have them get to know the job themselves. 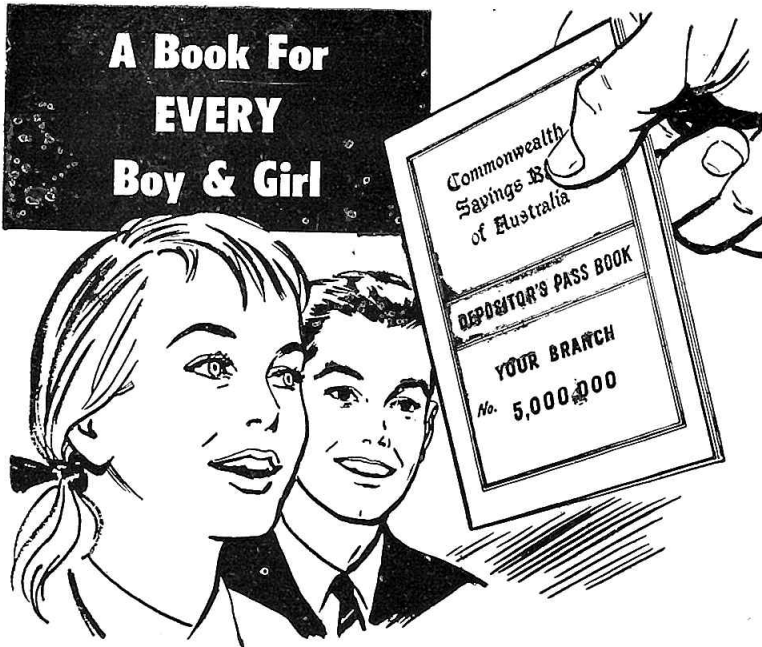
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During 1959, No. 21 Flight, Air Training Corps, has done much to provide this invaluable experience in leadership, confidence and self-discipline; qualities which are now much demanded in modern society.

What the unit lacked in numbers during the year, it certainly made up for with enthusiasm. Unfortunately, the full complement of the Flight was not reached at the beginning of the year, and even

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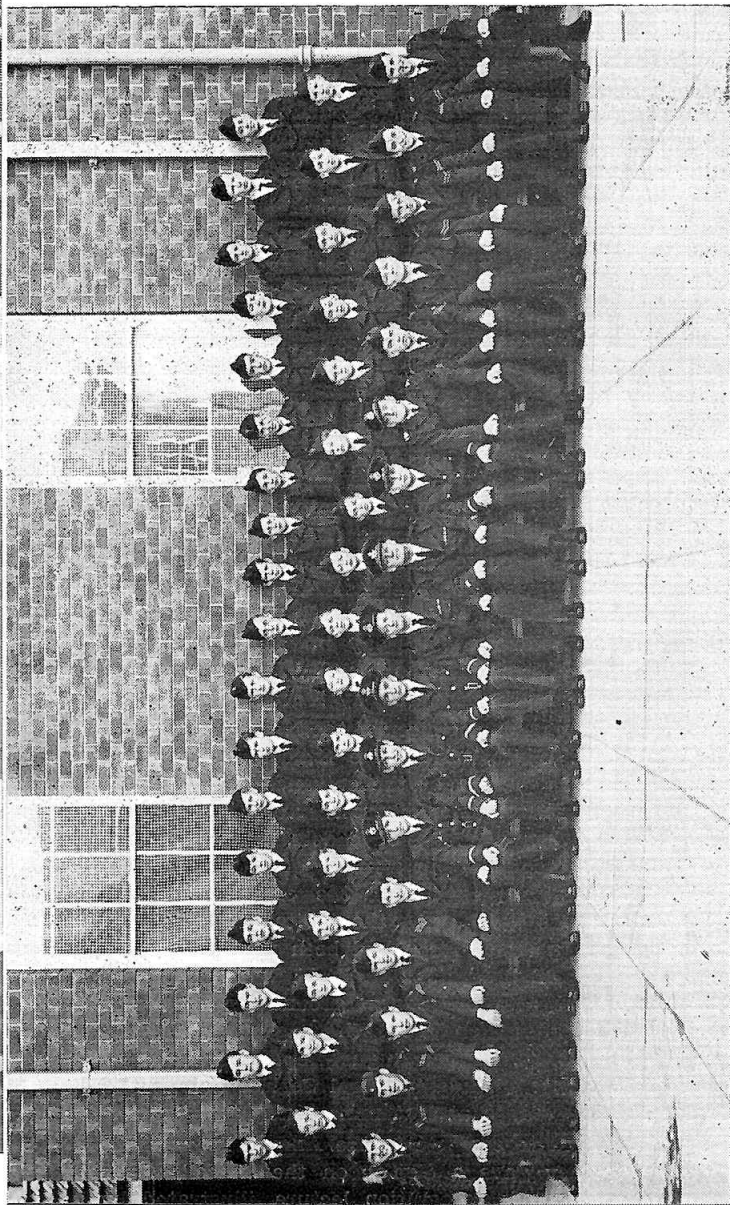
after a fresh intake in June, the unit remained below strength. Over the Christmas holiday period, No. 21 Flight cadets showed remarkable success in topping three out of six separate N.C.O. and Officer courses. The course toppers were: L.A.C. Brent, Junior N.C.O.; L.A.C. Cornish, Junior N.C.O.; F/Sgt. Finkelstein, Officer Course. These cadets were subsequently promoted.

Owing to the introduction of Public Speaking to the School in place of the Hobbies Period, there was a re-shuffling of training times, so as to accommodate our programme. Ultimately, lectures were held during the new extended lunch period, with training resuming at 3.30 p.m. For cadets of senior years, specialist training in Navigation, Wireless/Air Gunnery, Air Traffic Control and Ground Defence was introduced during the 8th period. In addition, an enlarged and revived syllabus of training for Basic Proficiency and Advanced Stages was inaugurated.

In the course of the year No. 21 Flight averaged one important function a month, outside the normal training times. As space will not permit mentioning all of them, it will have to suffice to mention only the more important. The unit participated in and won the Military Division of the March Past at the Newcastle Show. At the School's Annual Fete a specially trained drill squad performed in pouring rain the traditional and colourful "Changing of the Guard." During the May term holidays, L.A.C. Legge distinguished himself by topping his Junior N.C.O. Course at Rathmines. Twelve other cadets attended a General Service Camp at R.A.A.F. Canberra. As usual No. 21 Flight cadets participated in the Anzac Day Services on the Sunday at Sandgate, and the Saturday in the city at the Dawn Service and the City March later in the day. As customary, the whole Flight took part in the Empire Day March.

Early in June, the Commanding Officer of the New South Wales Squadron, Sqn./Ldr. E. G. White, visited the School for the first time in four years. He was greeted at the entrance to the school by a Guard of Honour in full ceremonial dress. Later in July, all precedents were broken when a group of cadets, representing a cross section of the Flight, took part in a series of two broadcasts over a city radio station. An outline of the organisation and activities of the A.T.C. was given. At the invitation of No. 16 Flight, A.T.C., with whom a close liaison had been made this year, 13 cadets attended a weekend bivouac at R.A.A.F. Williamstown on the 24th July. The Flight also broke new ground by holding a manoeuvre at Glenrock Lagoon on the 15th August which was solely organized by the N.C.O.'s. In the August-September holidays, a record number of 30 cadets attended General Service Camps and Junior and Senior N.C.O. Courses at Rathmines and Richmond.

The drill squad selected to compete in the Annual Inter-Flight Drill Competition in Sydney gave a display on the School's Open Day. A demonstration aircraft recognition lecture, illustrated by slides, was also given. Unfortunately, this year the drill squad did

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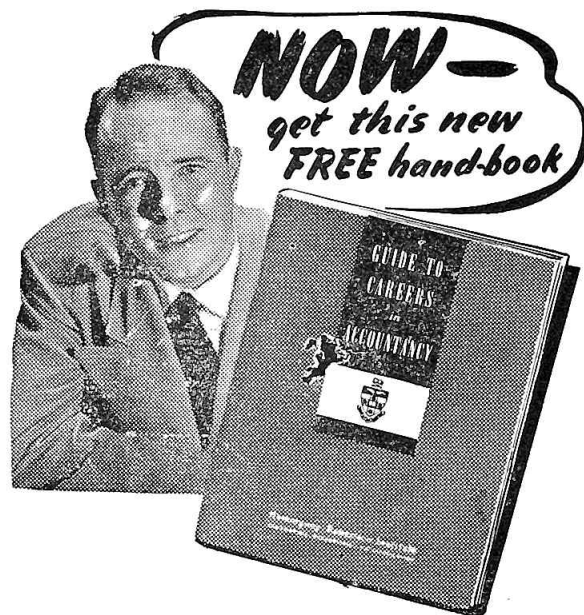


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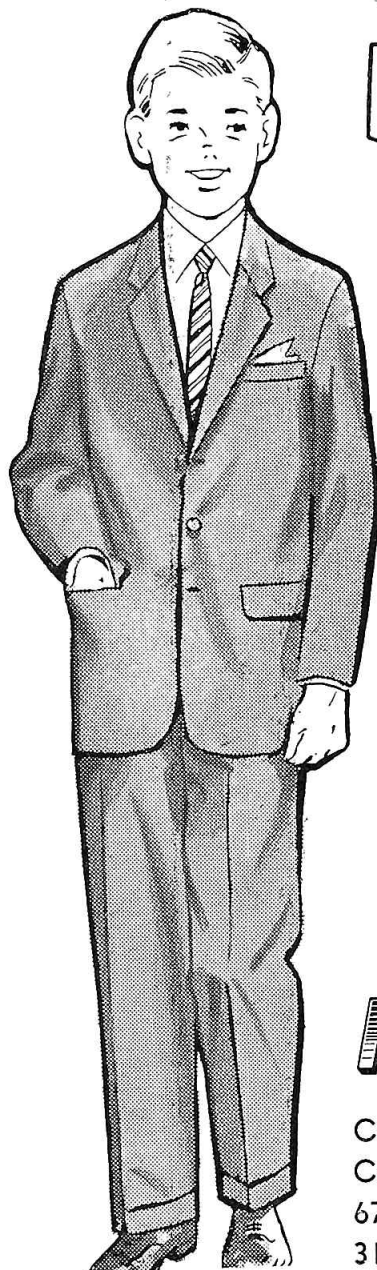
