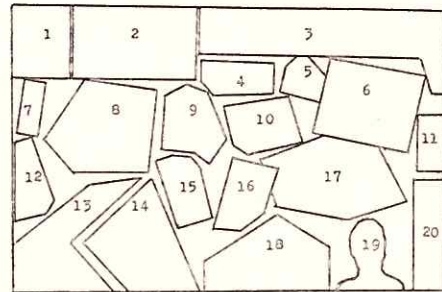

Stan Wawrzyniak, 15 years age champion, at the Zone Athletics Carnival.

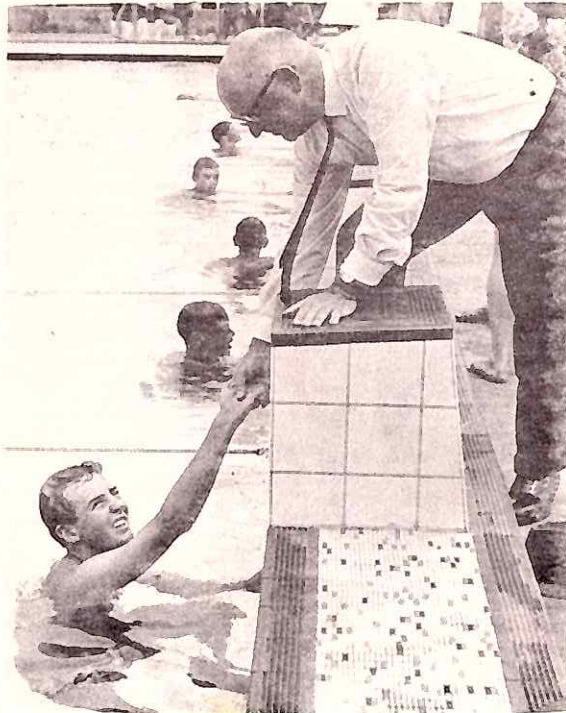

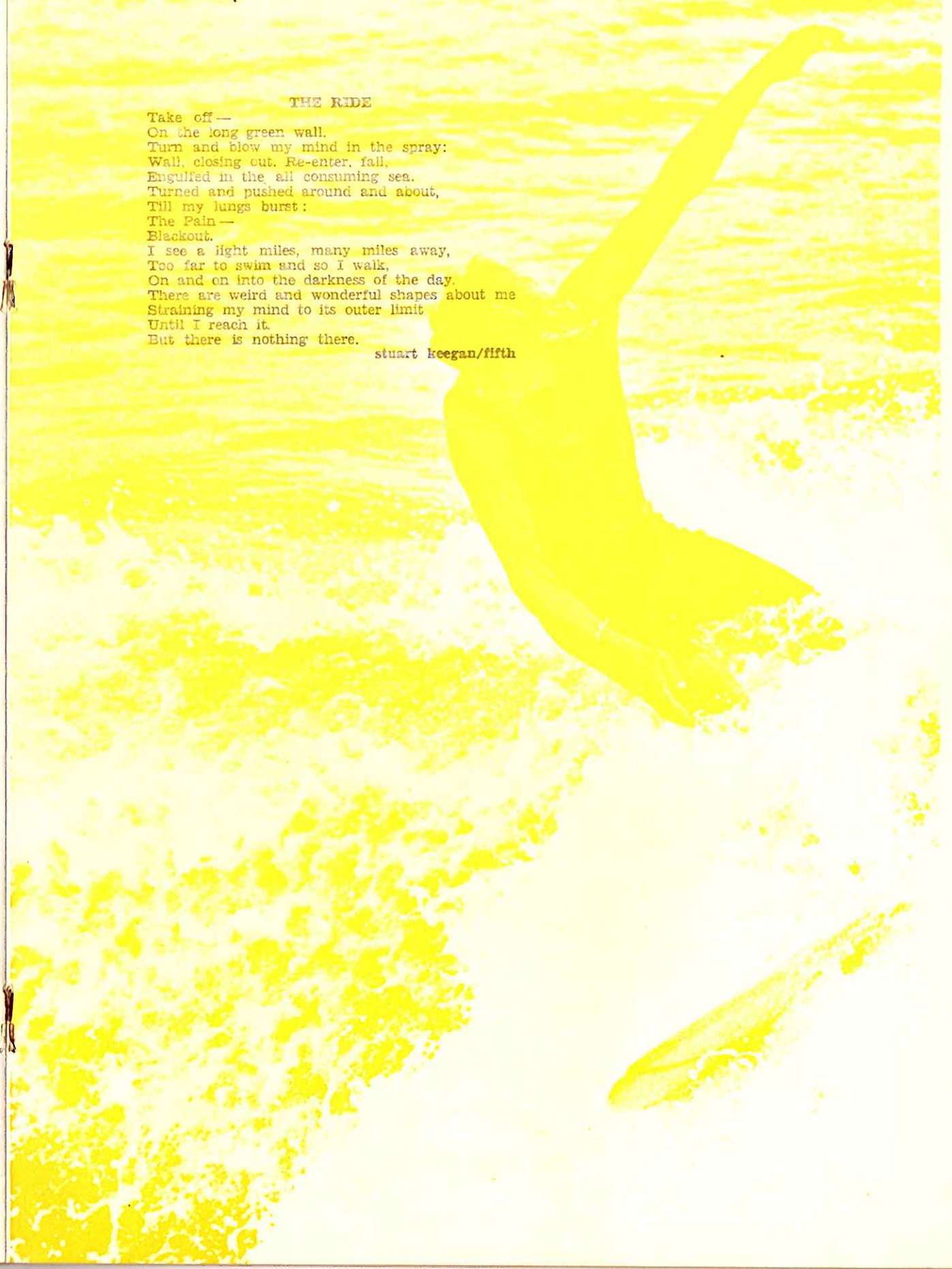

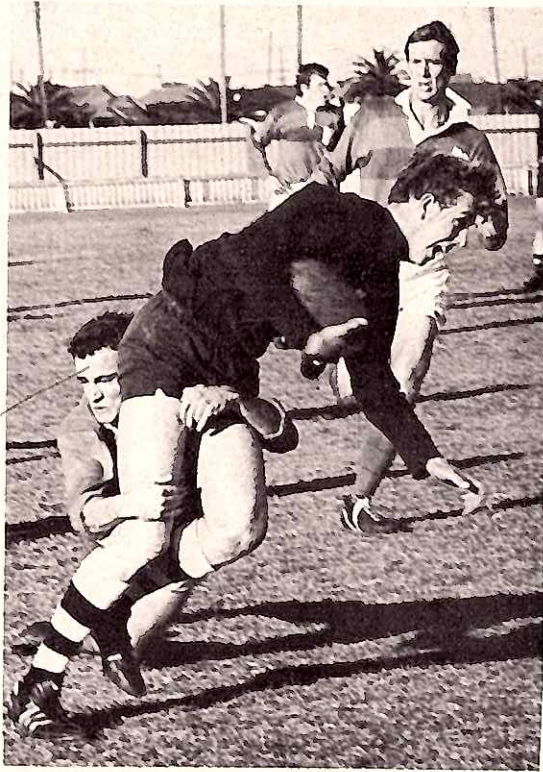

We were runners-up in the local "Evans Shield" Competition and finished third in the State-wide University Shield Competition.

A general lack of enthusiasm was evident in the first round matches of the Evans Shield Competition as thoughts and interest of the players were focused on our University Shield bid.

In University Shield matches some patches of bright football were displayed. After a slow beginning against Taree (15-7) the side swamped Raymond Terrace 33-7 in a match which held

interest to full-time, despite the difference in scores. From here we played Maitland in the Zone Final. After a bruising match the side finished with a well deserved 21-4 victory.

Then we met Randwick in a quarter final, in which a spasmodic first half display saw us down 7-5 at half-time. A stronger second half eventually saw the score 21-10 in our favour.

The side now qualified to meet Tamworth in a semi-final. A large crowd at Townson Oval saw the side go down by 12 points to 5 against Tamworth, the eventual winners of the Shield. On this occasion the team just didn't "click". Repeated silly mistakes and bad handling formed most of our play. It was one of those unfortunate games in which nothing seemed to go right and not one break went our way.

The play-off for third place against Riverstone once more saw the side down at half-time, the score being 9-7. A typical strong second half saw two fine tries and two goals "turn the tables" and make the final score 17-9 in our favour.

However, despite the final scores, I feel sure that every side which the Boys' High 1st XIII met this year will remember the encounter well; our side contained many talented and rugged players, and was the biggest Boys' High side fielded for several years.

Jeff ("Plummy") Davis proved a valuable asset to the side with his infallible handling and amazing coolness under pressure.

Peter Hawkins was the fast man of the side and "capped off" the season with a fine individual try against Riverstone. Peter's pace and ability earned him selection in the N.S.W. C.H.S. Rugby Union side.

Gary Gilmour, though only playing in five matches because of injury, turned on some dazzling displays. Gary is an excellent opportunist and his natural ability with ball handling made him very dangerous in attack.

Michael Burns started the season in the centre position but later swapped positions with winger Jeff Shields. Michael ("Buzz") is a prolific tackler and his copybook style of tackling brought many an opposition player to a sudden stop.

Jeff Shields, the youngest member of the side, was this year's "find." His consistent displays of dogged defence and his many penetrating runs earned him N.S.W. C.H.S. Rugby League honours.

The inside centre spot was filled by robust Jim Garis. Perhaps one of the most popular players ever to put on a red and blue jumper, Jim made his debut as a centre this season, having previously played second row. He too earned N.S.W. C.H.S. selection.

Many of Jim's crashing runs, however, stemmed from the perfectly timed passes of five-eighth Peter Clark. Peter fed the backs well and his low tackling and cover defence should be noted by all Rugby League players. Peter once again gained N.S.W. C.H.S. Rugby Union selection.

Our half-back Russell Worth, though lacking in size, was not lacking in heart. He distributed the ball intelligently and made many fine breaks through opposing defences. Russell also gained N.S.W. C.H.S. Rugby League representation.

Robert Wilkinson, yet another N.S.W. C.H.S. Rugby League representative, worried many opposing teams with his speed and size. Rob used the "palm-off" very effectively and this skill often led to the initial break for one of his long runs.

Rob's second row partner, Stephen Bland, also big and fast, did a lot of work in general play and his all round ability gained for him N.S.W. C.H.S. Rugby Union honours. Steve received a very heavy knock against Randwick and, because of concussion, did not play after this match.

John Jenkins took over the second row spot for the remaining matches, and in these, as well as previous matches in which John had played as a replacement, he returned a non-stop performance and this proved very valuable to the side.

Gary Jones and David Parker were our front-row forwards. Gary was our most improved player and finished the season playing some fine football. Gary was "in everything" and his enthusiasm was evident off the field, as well as on the field.

The other "prop," David Parker, did most of the bullocking work in the tight play and Dave's crashing runs and tackles demoralized many opposing players. Dave was a late addition to the N.S.W. C.H.S. Rugby League sides but many feel that he deserved earlier selection.

Our hooker Bruce Williamson consistently put in tireless efforts. He gave a fine distribution from "dummy half" and on nearly all occasions brought the team out ahead in the scrums.

Stephen Rich, who scored two great tries against Riverstone, Jeffrey Hogg, John Peady, Robert Campbell, Chris Parry, John Marshall and David Wright, also played in 1st Grade matches this season, and all returned excellent performances.

Thanks must go to all who supported the side on various occasions and special thanks go to Mr. Richardson for his strong interest in the side; to Mr. Gardner, who recorded the statistics throughout the games; to Mr. Claude Sharpe who always had an encouraging word; to Doctor Wilkinson for his medical assistance and spirited support; and to the Girls' High Cheer Squad who provided sideline encouragement for the side when we played Tamworth and Riverstone.

Finally, thanks and sincere appreciation must go to Mr. Keith Giddy, this year's coach. Mr. Giddy worked enthusiastically and devoted much time to moulding the 1st XIII into a team. He has earned both the respect and friendship of all team members and the side was undoubtedly fortunate in having such a coach.

Our only regret is that we were unable to reward Mr. Giddy by winning the University Shield and making it 16 for N.B.H.S.; he surely deserved some such reward.

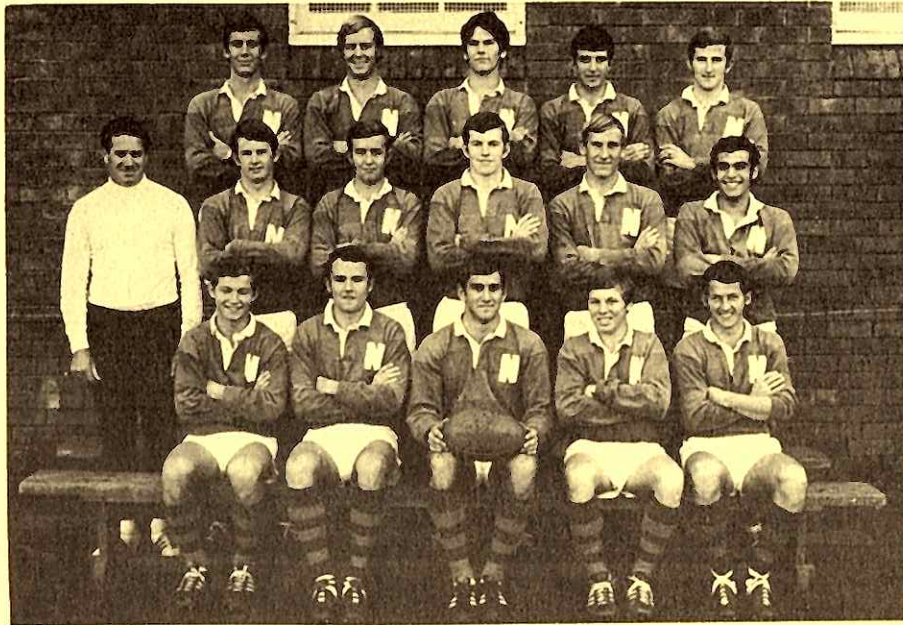

STATE REPRESENTATIVES

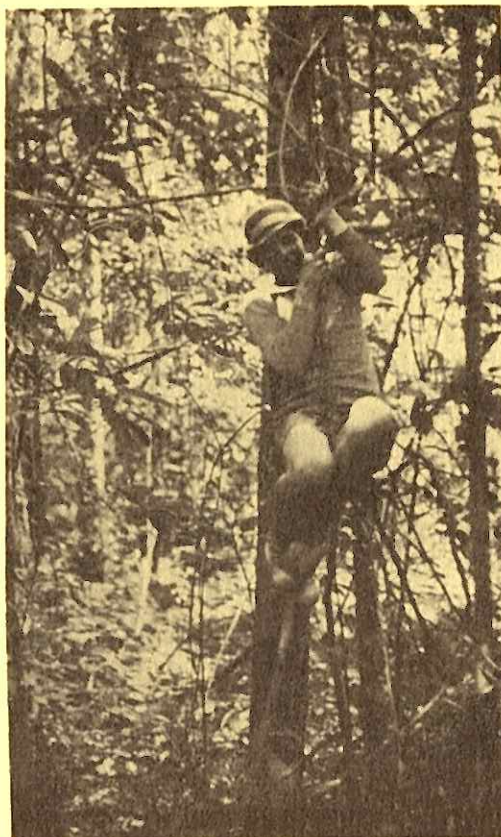

This year the team played only three matches, against Marist number one and two teams and our own number two team. We were successful on each occasion, and the batting in each game was particularly bright.

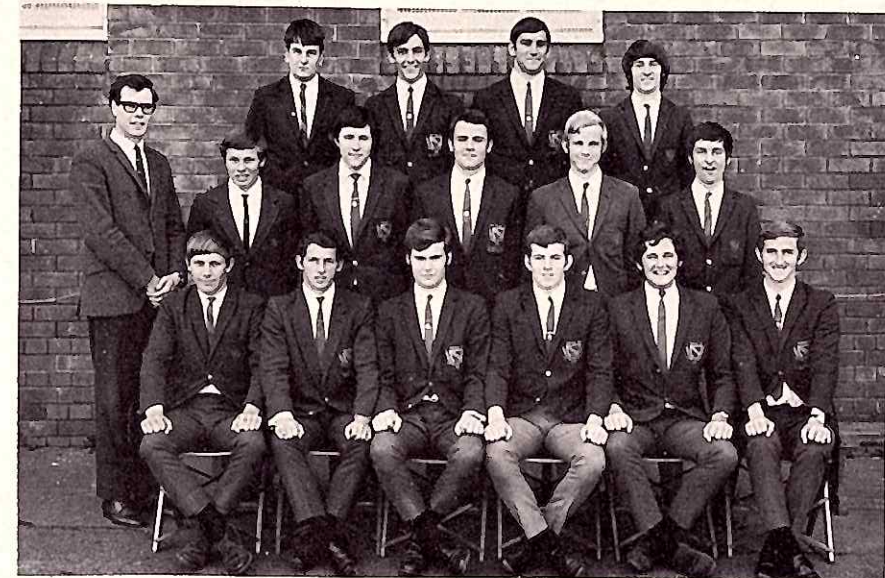

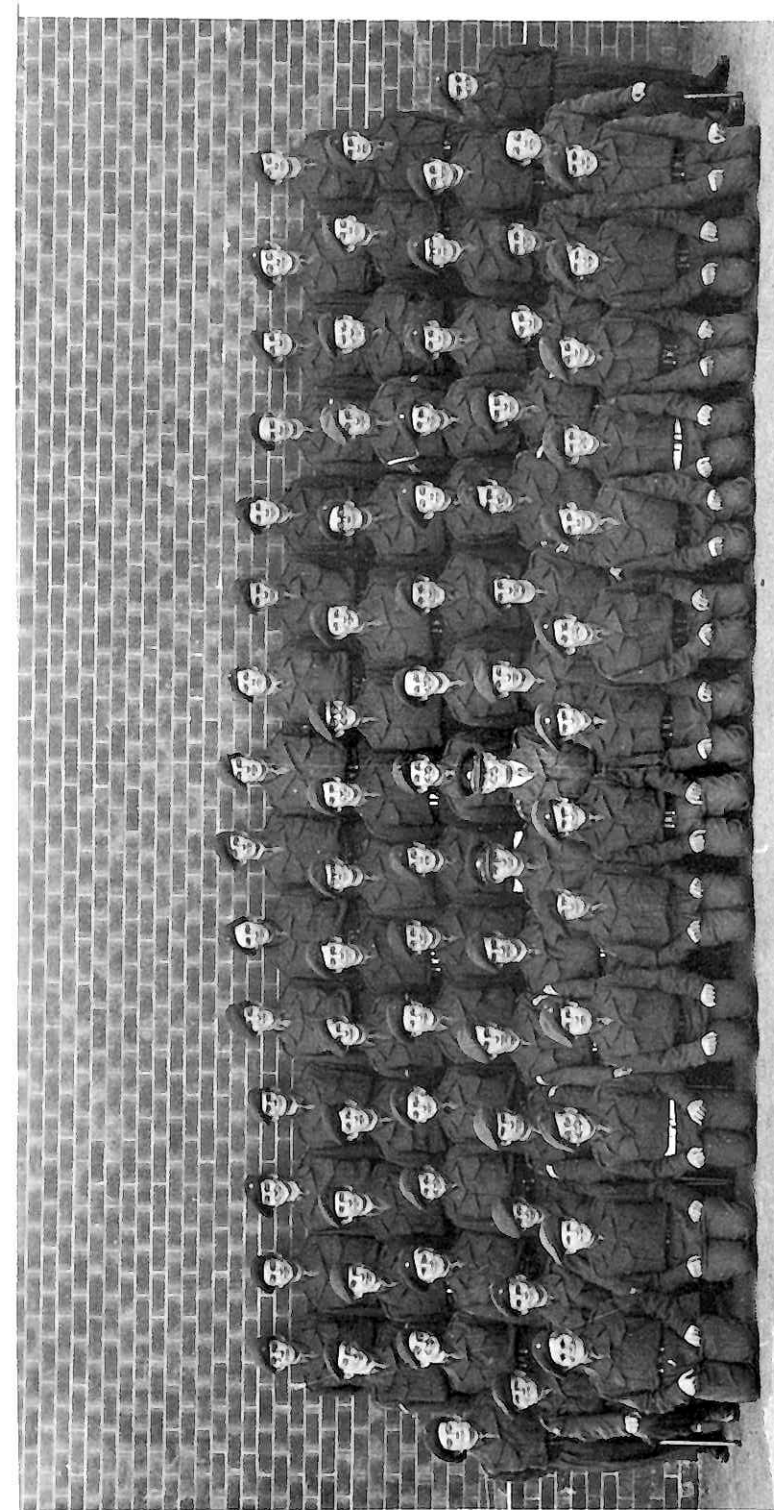

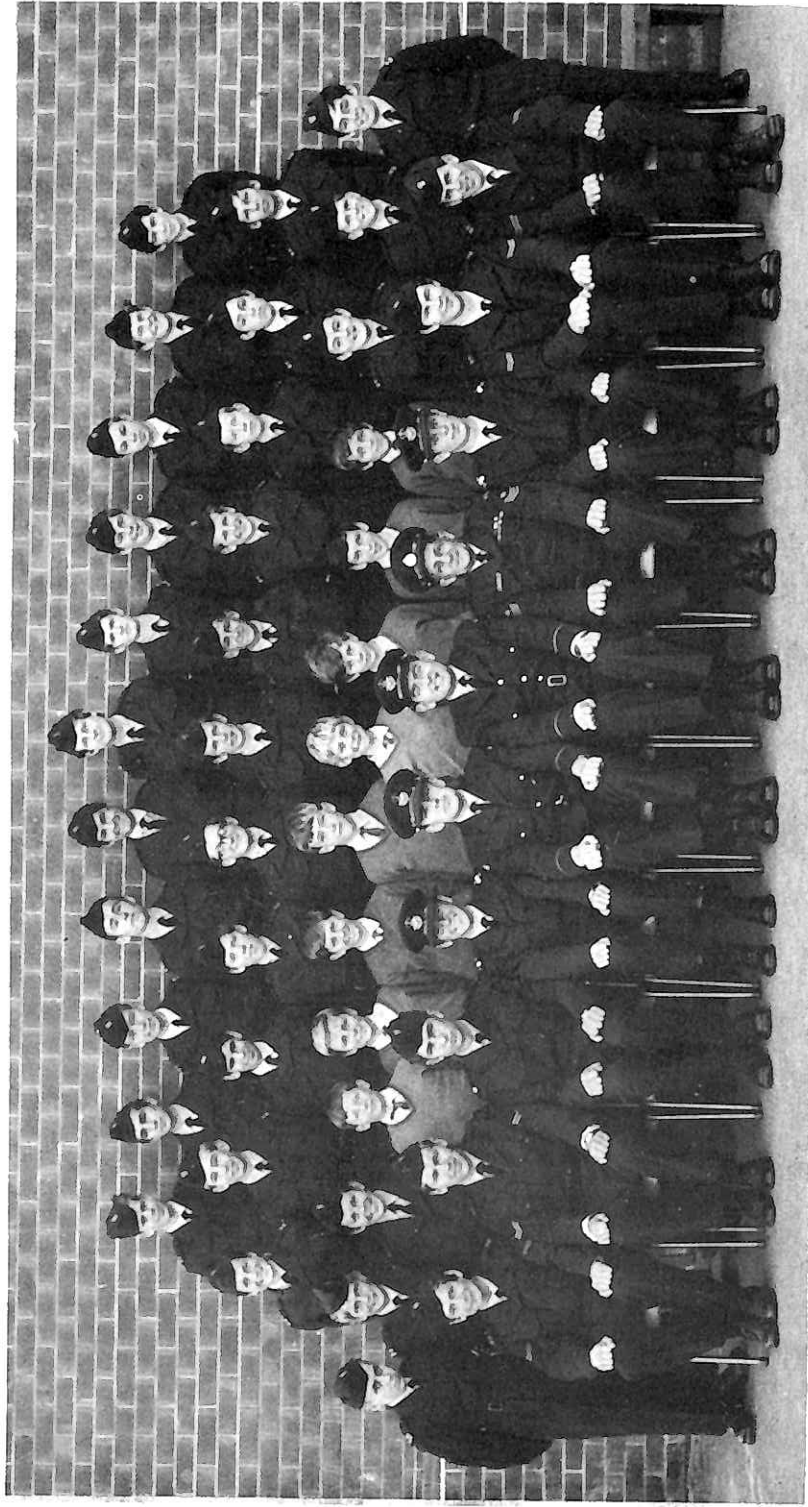
