

I proceed to the exit, wishing to leave the stomach of this monster. All round, the cacophony of a normal supermarket once again rose to ear


splitting proportions all round me.






Change

For thirty-four years, the names of Mr. and Mrs. Ben Timmins have been infamous with the staff and pupils of Newcastle Boys' High. Whether for coke, sausage roll or cream bun, they have fulfilled the shouted orders of thousands of boys, sold crate upon crate of coke, tray upon tray of cakes, thousands of bread rolls and tens of thousands of minties. And even now, they're not retiring, for the new canteen in the new building will still be manned by the same old staff, much to the relief and joy of the hundreds who frequent it.

The shift to the new premises will merely be another of the many changes that they have experienced at the school. The first canteen was situated in the change rooms, with no electricity, an old stove and an even older ice-box. The teachers, formal in the customary suits, used to eat their lunches in the canteen while the boys, short haired and neatly uniformed were served with penny pies, tuppeny rolls and penny glasses of cordial. In 1945 on Victory Day, the Timmins's arrived ready for the day only to discover that the boys had been given the day off. And so it was decided that the food would be given to the Woodland Boys' Home in Wallsend. Going back even further, Ben can remember the first time he came to Waratah. He'd been working with his mother and aunt in the old canteen up at the Hill High since he was fifteen and when the first forms came out to Waratah, Ben was given the management of the new canteen. Ben can still remember a lot of the old teachers and pupils: Snozz Davies, Spot Burrows, Snipper Ronns and Reg Trew, famous for his shark rescue. Then there were the teachers like Mr. Jacobs who never wore any teeth until the inspector came, or Miss Morrison the librarian, the only female teacher on the staff for years. And of course, Charlie Goffet, an unsurpassed legend in his own time.

Ben also remembers many past students who have gone on to make a name for themselves. Neville Begg, the horse trainer; top footballers, Brian Carlson and AlbertPaul are a few that come to mind. Occasionally Ben has the good fortune to share the company of past students over a small glass of refreshment and talk over old times. Ben would like to be remembered to all past students and hopes that they have found what they wanted in life.

On the whole, the school hasn't really changed. It's not so strict and formal now and the teachers are younger but there has always been that shouting, pushing line of students every recess and luchtime. And Ben has really sold a lot, as these average show:




The Under 13 Rugby League team had a very successful season by finishing the competition as undefeated Premiers.





They remained undefeated until their last match of the competition and entered the finals against Marist Brothers, a team they had already defeated 3 goals to 1.


The final was played in blustery conditions and despite some good play, which resulted in hitting the cross bar on several occasions, Marist Brothers won 2 goals to 1.







In all the team played very well all season and deserved to be on top at the end. I hope all the boys who were in this team will carry on with the game in their senior years.



In the final we beat Pius convincingly 5.7.37 to 0.4.4.


