Means Test Move On Scholarships

Newcastle Boys' High P. and C. is seeking State-wide support from High School P. and C. branches for its proposal to have the means test relaxed for payment of living-away-from-home allowances to holders of Commonwealth scholarships.

The secretary of the P. and C. (Mr. L. Boyd) has prepared a statement to show at what stage of the family income the living allowance disappeared, and to show how adversely affected are country parents of Commonwealth Scholarship holders who had to travel to Sydney to gain higher education. A copy of the statement is now being sent to country high schools with the request that their P. and C. branches approach their Federal members to support the motion, which will be presented at the annual conference of the Federation of the P. and C. Associations in Sydney on August 15 and 17.

Combined Lunch ABORIGINES' NUMBERS

RISING WITH MORE SECURITY

For 15 years the aboriginal population of Australia had been increasing, Mrs. K. Coaldrake, of Paterson, said yesterday.

Mrs. Coaldrake and her husband, Rev. Coaldrake, spent eight years at an aboriginal mission in the Kimberleys in Western Australia.

She said that since the aborigines had been given some security, such as small houses and rations at mission stations, they had started living a family life and having more babies.

In former days, when the aboriginal family lived a nomadic life always on the move, the mother could carry only one small child or baby at a time so the families had to be smaller. The arrival of twins in those days was very serious.

Mrs. Coaldrake was speaking to 300 guests at a luncheon party given in the City Hall Supper Room by Waratah and Bar Beach women's auxiliaries of Newcastle Boys' High School.

Land Of Drought

In the eight years she lived in the Kimberleys there were three droughts.

She arrived there in August during a drought when the 50-acre mission compound was two feet deep in dust. She saw no rain for the next nine months.

The temperature in August was 95 degrees during the day but a month later had risen to well over 100.

Mrs. Coaldrake's wooden home had no ceiling and had canvas blinds instead of windows. Twice a day during the drought willy-willies would sweep through the compound, filling the houses with dust.

Mrs. Coaldrake said one of the most exciting moments of her time in the Kimberleys was when the water scheme was put into operation at the mission station.

With a small grant from the West Australian Government the water supply was built by a Government engineer and the mission staff.

Working in temperatures of 115 degrees in the shade the engineer, Mr. Coaldrake and

his brother and a couple of aborigines took only six months to bring the water supply from the headwaters of a river five miles away over a small mountain to the mission.

They had to work with gloves because the pipes were so hot that they blistered their hands.

Life in the outback of Australia satisfied the spirit of adventure most people had

when they were children, Mrs. Coaldrake said. Because of attempts to find security and success most people's spirit of adventure was not fulfilled.

She hoped her six-year-old son would go to work in the outback some day.

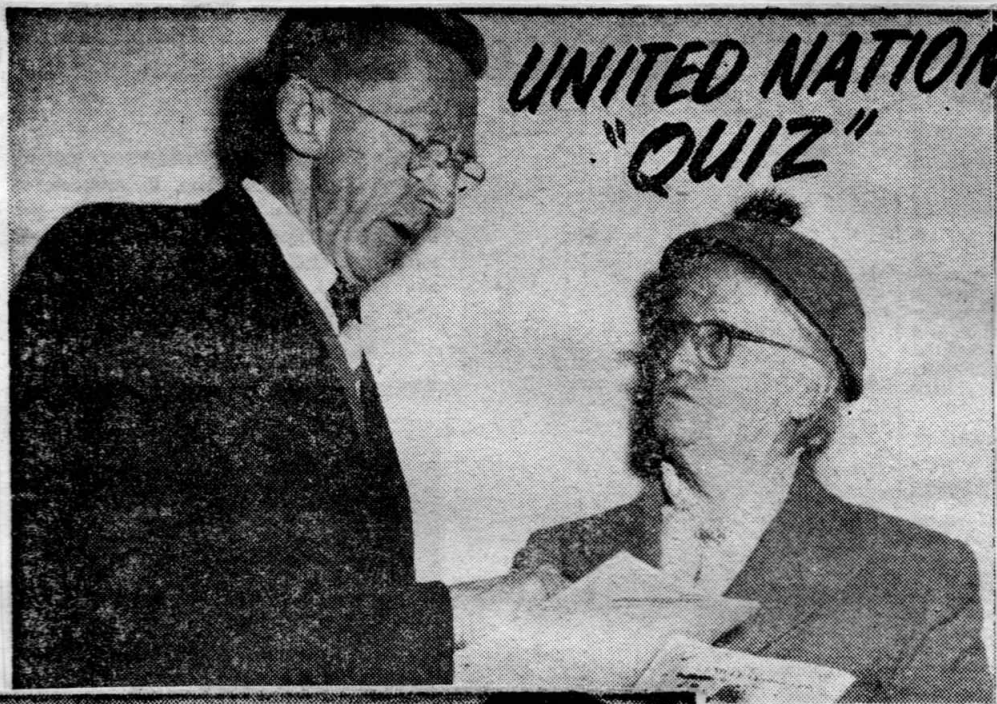

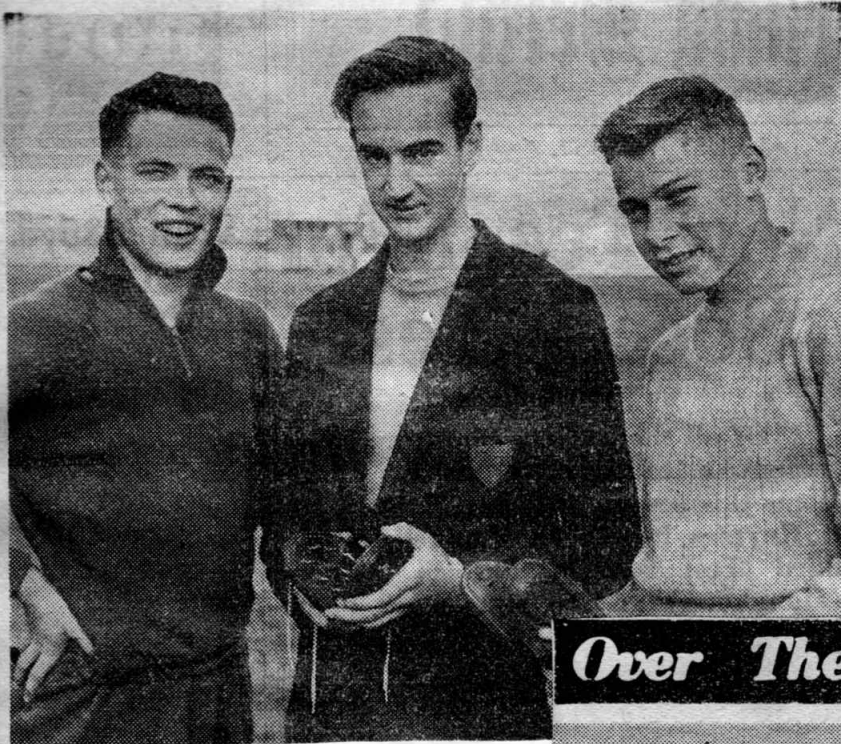

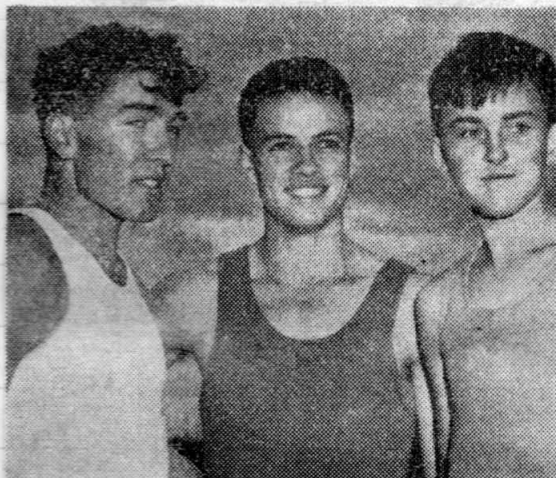

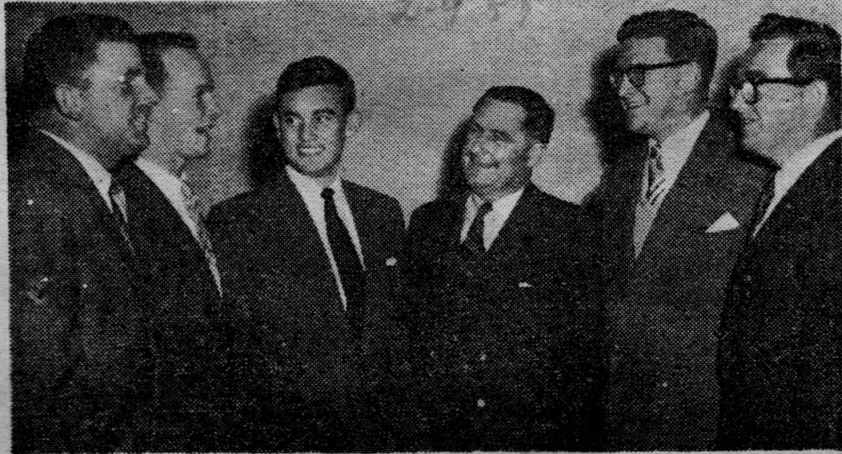

Interest Wanes In P. And C.

Members of Newcastle Boys' High Parents and Citizens' Association expressed alarm last night at a lack of interest in the parents and citizens' movement.

There was only a small attendance at the meeting.

The Treasurer (Mr. J. Wingrove) said there were about 1600 parents with boys at the school but only 13 attended the meeting.

Notices of meetings were handed to the pupils each month, but more than 50 per cent. of the parents did not get them, he said.

Mr. G. Owens said most other parents and citizens' associations were having the same trouble.

"Fathers are missing a great opportunity to learn what their children are doing and help them have a better education," he said. "The association has held discussions before and the main hall has been packed. If we could get a guest speaker on something that is topical, we would get a good attendance. We need something to hit the hearts of the parents to get them along."

'Plenty To Do'

The President (Mr. L. Warland) said the association was very active but only a few members were active. There was plenty for parents to do if they became interested.

Members who had attended regularly could try to get another parent to come. Many parents were tied up with other organisations but many did not care what the association did.

The association instructed the executive to arrange for a guest speaker, to hold discussions, or to have pictures or a concert, to attract members.

Mr. Wingrove said a certificate should be given to pupils who failed to pass the leaving certificate. If the school thought the pupil should have passed, they could recommend him for a secondary certificate so that he would have something to show for his superior education. Under present conditions the student who had five years in high schools and failed in the leaving only had the intermediate to show for his work.

"I do not mean the boy who only goes back to play football but the boy who has genuinely worked hard — a boy whom the school thought would get his leaving certificate," he said.

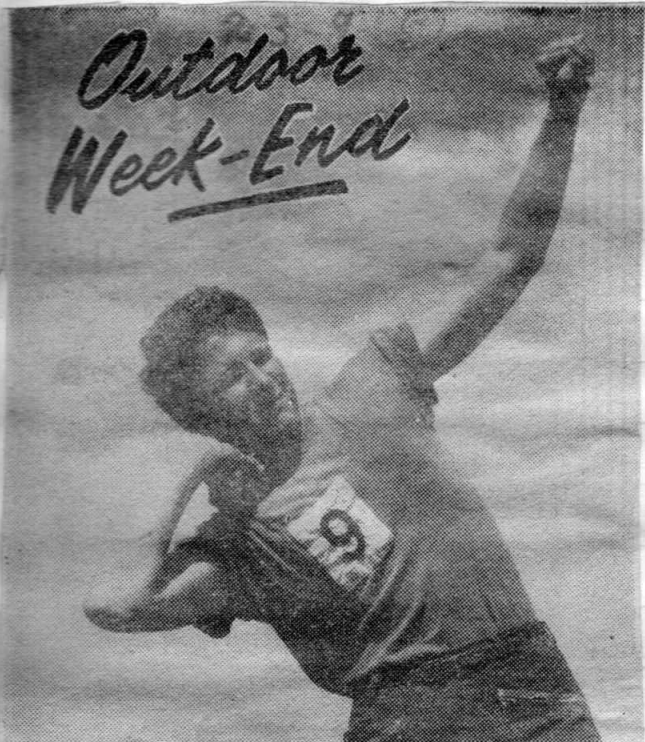

U.N. Is Twelve Years Old

By F. H. Beard

As the United Nations Organisation celebrates its twelfth birthday to-day, its need in the world is greater than it has ever been before.

Sputnik has given one last warning to mankind that scientific advance has reached a point where it is capable of annihilating the human race with the greatest accuracy and ingenuity. All the old cleavages—East against West, Capitalism against Com-

munism, Christian against pagan, white against coloured—are now irrelevant.

MR. Beard is President of Newcastle branch of the United Nations Association of Australia.

There is only one issue before the world: cooperate or perish. As the one nearly universal agent of cooperation (it represents seven-eighths of the human race), I believe that U.N. is the only human hope for the future.

THE achievements of the past year have enhanced the prestige of the Organisation and increased its prospects of success in its major task of preventing war. It has no effective machinery, under its charter, of coercing a great power, and it could not take action against Russia over Hungary, but even there the moral influence that it wielded may have had more far-reaching effects than we know.

Its actions over Suez were really successful. The agreement of Britain and France to its request that they leave Egypt, the successful setting up of the United Nations Emergency Force to police the Israel-Egypt border and the clearing of the Suez Canal showed international cooperation at its best.

U.N.E.F. consists of 6000 men from ten nations on four continents. They serve under the blue and white United Nations flag, and they are the first truly international force set up to keep the peace, as opposed to the Korean force, which was established to resist aggression.

The Secretary-General (Mr. Dag Hammarskjöld) described them as "soldiers of peace . . . the front line of moral force which extends around the world." Remarkable cooperation was shown in the creation of this force. Three days after the General Assembly agreed to the plans for it, the first units were landed at a staging area in Italy. Within five days, they were in Egypt.

SIMILAR cooperation was shown when the United Nations salvage fleet of 32 ships from seven nations carried out the mammoth task of clearing the Suez Canal five weeks ahead of schedule. The director of the undertaking attributed it to "wonderful international cooperation" and "the United Nations spirit."

With more of that spirit developing among the 82 members of U.N., who, whatever their differences, at least meet regularly round a table to talk over their problems, and with the sense of urgency that recent events must surely pro-

WHATEVER anyone may think of its political activities, U.N. has very few critics of its humanitarian work. The second objective of its charter — to raise the lot of mankind — is being pursued unremittingly. The many agencies are at work in the backward countries to help care for needy children, to wipe out plagues and epidemics, to improve agricultural methods, to assist in national development plans of every kind.

Some 6000 experts from 80 nations have worked in more than 90 countries, and some 12,000 fellows and scholars have been trained in more than a hundred countries. We are all aware of the links of friendship that this work is forging among the world's peoples.

THE success of the United Nations must finally depend on individuals. Its charter begins with us all: "We, the peoples . . . pledge ourselves . . . to combine our efforts." That is why the United Nations Association exists. People should take an interest in what U.N. is doing. They should demand that their national policies are geared to further international cooperation. They should enter generously into all the movements to help the

backward countries, where two-thirds of the world's people are insufficiently fed and clothed.

The association provides a means of gaining the information necessary, and of expressing opinions that, with the federal and international nature of the organisation, could influence United Nations policy.

The Newcastle branch of the association has done much study, particularly in the field of human rights, where a special understanding committee has been working. It has held numerous conferences to examine national policies, such as those relating to New Guinea and to our own aborigines, in the light of the U.N. Charter. It has inaugurated an annual concert in aid of the International Children's Fund, which concert will be in the City Hall this year on November 14.

By radio quizzes and other means has encouraged the young people to be interested in the United Nations.

In addition, each year a U.N. commemoration service of an inter-denominational nature is held at Newcastle Beach on United Nations Sunday. May I suggest that the people of our city join us next Sunday afternoon at the Band Rotunda at 2.30, and pledge their support to the organisation on which, I believe, the future of mankind depends.

Leaving Chemistry Paper Called "Difficult"

Today Leaving Certificate candidates sat for chemistry and combined physics and chemistry papers with the chemistry paper described authoritatively as difficult.

A science teacher at Newcastle Boys' High School described the paper as a very searching one and comparatively difficult.

Weaker boys would find great difficulty in giving satisfactory answers to the six questions required to be answered.

A Newcastle Tech. High science master said the chemistry paper would give full scope to the bright boy. He considered that the questions

were rather vague in parts and only intelligent students would be able to fill in the gaps left by the examiners. Otherwise he thought the paper was quite fair.

The combined physics and chemistry paper was of about the usual standard, he added—"quite hard, but not extremely so."

A Newcastle Girls' High science mistress described the chemistry paper as very

searching, but within the syllabus. She said there was nothing unfair in the paper, but it was harder than average.

This year, candidates had to answer five questions instead of the usual four, but the examiners were at liberty to ask for any number of questions to be answered.

This teacher described the combined paper as reasonable, although she thought the physics section fairly hard.
