A Day in the Life of an Advertomaniac

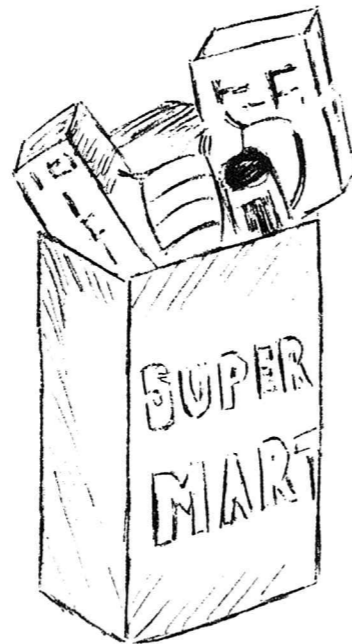
(someone who can't resist T.V. ads)

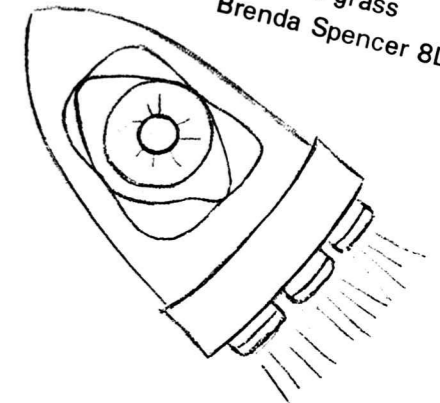

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PHOTOGRAPH CLUB

The photographic club has been functioning for almost 2 years and is open to years 11 and 12. There are 45 members in all. Members may have the use of the school's darkroom which is situated on the ground floor of the New Wing on the South side.

In the darkroom there are:- 3 enlargers, and 5 reel developing tank, 3 masking boards, 3 focus finders, 3 timers, small & large developing trays and all necessary chemicals.

The school supplies cheap film, printing paper and negative holders. The paper is available in 5" x 4", 10" x 8" and 20" x 16".

Mr. McLaughlin teaches the members the correct use of their cameras, developing and printing techniques as well as giving appropriate advice.

This year there are 3 year 12 students who are submitting photography as their major art works for their 3 unit H.S.C. (This is worth 50% of their mark).

Members of the photographic club also provide copies of photos taken during the Swimming Carnival, the Athletics Carnival and around the school for a small fee.

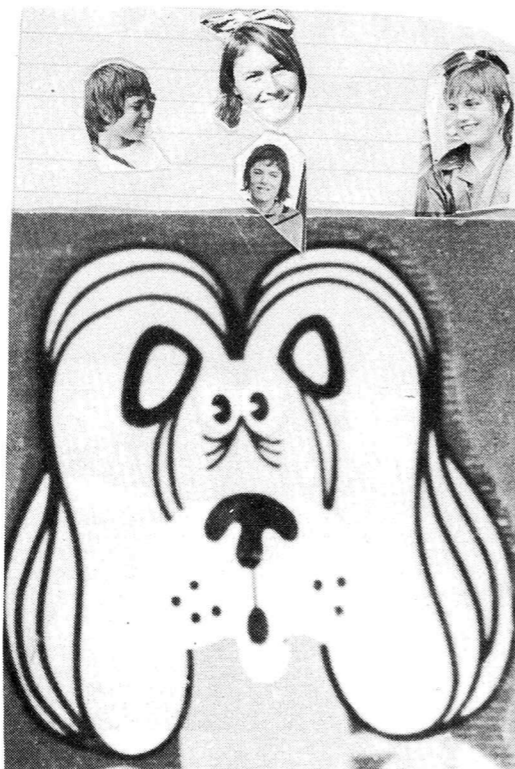
The school provides one free roll of film per week which is used to take photographs of events occurring around the school. Many of the photographs in this magazine were taken by members of the photographic club.

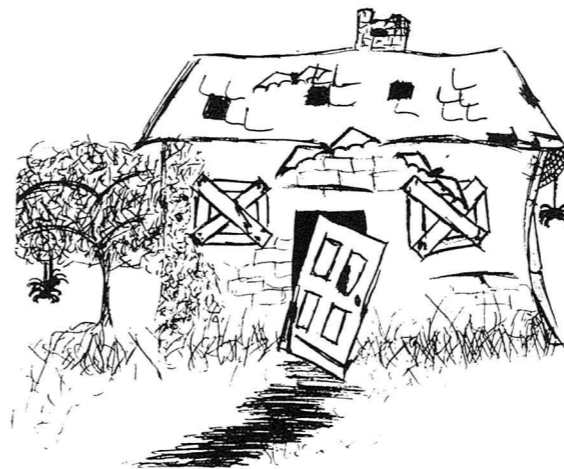
FRENCH CAMP

And when the wave moves slowly back you see these things no more.

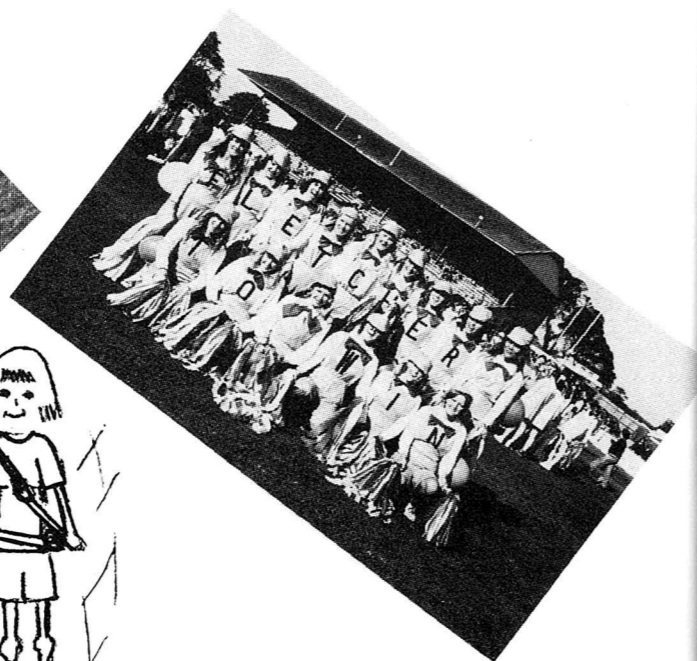
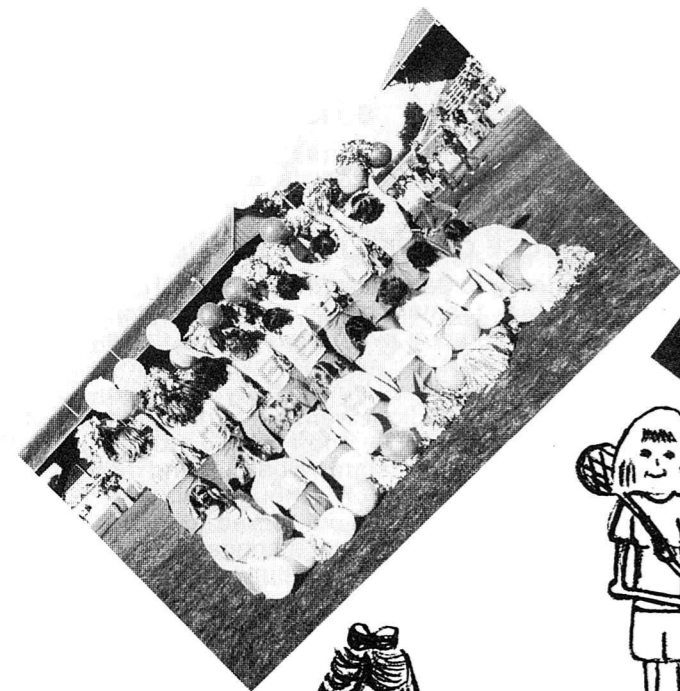
